BATES GILL

Dr Bates Gill is Director of the Stockholm International Peace Research Institute (SIPRI). Founded in 1966, SIPRI is an independent think-tank focusing on bettering the conditions for a more stable and secure world through research and analysis on international and regional security challenges, nonproliferation, arms control, peacekeeping and conflict prevention, military spending, arms trade, and defense production. Before joining SIPRI, Dr. Bates Gill held the Freeman Chair in China Studies at the Center for Strategic and International Studies in Washington, D.C from 2002 to 2007, and he previously established and directed East Asia-related research centers at the Brookings Institution in Washington and at the Center for Nonproliferation Studies at the Monterey Institute, Monterey, California.

Dr. Gill has a long record of research and publication on international and regional security issues, particularly regarding arms control, non-proliferation, strategic nuclear relations, peacekeeping and military-technical development, especially with regard to China and Asia. In recent years, this research has broadened to encompass other security-related trends in the post-cold war world, including multilateral security organizations and the impact of domestic politics and development on the foreign and security policies of states. This work has resulted in more than 125 publications, including books, monographs, chapters, journal articles, essays, magazine columns and opinion pieces, and research-related travel to more than 40 countries. He is the author, co-author, or co-editor of seven books, including, most recently, Rising Star: China's New Security Diplomacy (Brookings, 2007). Dr. Gill received his Ph.D. in Foreign Affairs from the Woodrow Wilson Department of Government and Foreign Affairs, University of Virginia, USA. He has lived more than two years in China and Taiwan, and more than six years in Europe (France, Sweden, Switzerland).
