

**Lukasz Kulesa** is an analyst of international security and Acting Head of the Research Office at the Polish Institute of International Affairs (Warsaw).

He is a graduate of the Law Department of Jagiellonian University (Cracow); holds a Master of Arts degree in International Relations and European Studies from Central European University (Budapest).

From 2003 he has been working as an analyst at the Polish Institute of International Affairs (PISM), dealing mainly with issues of international security: proliferation of WMD, security policy of Poland, NATO, and the European Union (ESDP). Between 2005 and 2008, he was the coordinator of the International Security Project at the Institute. In September 2008, he was appointed Acting Head of the Research Office.
